I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during said war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time voluntarily abandoned my post of duty in the said service; or (that I was in the service of the State of Texas during the war, to protect said State against the Indians and Mexicans for more than 6 months). That I was honorably discharged or surrendered.

that I have been a bona fide citizen of this State since prior to January 1, A. D. 1900, and have been continuously since a citizen of the State of Texas. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$300.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment or other source whatever which amounts to \$300.00 per annum, nor do I receive from any source whatever money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$300.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does any one hold in trust for my wife, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over one thousand dollars, exclusive of a home of the value of not more than \$1000.00; nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State, or from the United States, or from any other source, and that I am not an inmate of the Confederate Home, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

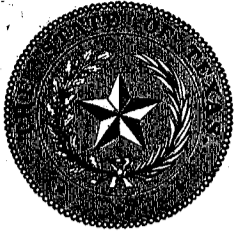

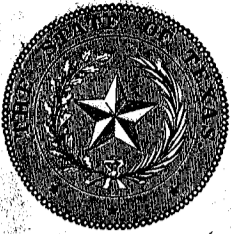

The name W. L. Marshall has not been found on the rolls, on file in this office, of any company of the 3d Arkansas Infantry, Confederate States Army, nor has any record been found of the capture or parole of a man of this name and organization.

The records show, however, that one Lafayette Marshall, private, Company H, 3d Arkansas Infantry, Confederate States Army, enlisted June 10, 1861. On the roll of the company for November and December, 1862 (last roll upon which his name is borne), he is reported transferred to the 8th Kentucky Regiment.

The records of prisoners of war show that one Lafayette Marshall, private, Company C, 3d Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army, was captured June 12, 1864, at Cynthiana, Kentucky, and released on the same date, upon taking the oath of allegiance, at Camp Morton, Indiana.

The name Lafayette Marshall has not been found on the rolls, on file in this office, of the 3d Kentucky Cavalry, Confederate States Army.

To County Judges:

I have the honor to inform you that, under the Act approved March 26, 1909, I have been appointed Commissioner of Pensions, and that all the records, approved and rejected applications, etc., of the former pension department of the Comptroller's Office have been transferred to my custody. Therefore, all matters pertaining to pensions, since May 12, 1899, should hereafter be addressed to me. The Thirty-first Legislature failed to give me an assistant, and in order to facilitate the business of this office and prevent correspondence, that without assistance would probably become burdensome, I beg leave to submit the following:

1. Applications now on file, rejected on account of ownership of property or marriage subsequent to March 1, 1866, will, upon request of the applicant, or his attorney, be reconsidered and passed on under the provisions of the new law. The right to call for additional testimony, if deemed necessary, is reserved.

2. County judges will be furnished, for use of claimants, the following described application blanks:

Form A—For use of indigent soldiers.

Form B—For use of indigent widows of soldiers.

Form C—For use of indigent soldiers who are blind, maimed or totally disabled.

Form D—For use of indigent widows of soldiers who are blind or totally disabled.

In addition printed forms of "Affidavit of Physician," for use of pensioners who come under the class of Forms C and D. Also printed interrogatories and deposition blanks to be used for the purpose of obtaining the testimony of non-resident witnesses.

3. It is held by me that the law provides for the grant of pensions only to volunteers, or soldiers who, under the provisions of the conscript law, were assigned to service in the field, or detailed for special service in government armories, shops, etc., either in the Confederate Army or Navy.

4. It is also held by me that no pensions can be paid for service in the militia of the States of the Confederacy, or for service under special laws of the State of Texas, for the protection of the frontier, or for service as Homeguards or in the Reserve Corps, and that applications for the branches of service named will have to be rejected.

5. The law does not provide for a succession to a pension; when a pensioner dies, the pension ceases. The widow of a pensioner has no preference over the widow of any other soldier who is in indigent circumstances, but, if qualified, in order to obtain a pension, it will be necessary for her to file an original application with the county judge, but if she has trouble in making proof of her husband's service in the army, this office will furnish, free of charge, a certificate of the proof filed with her husband's application for a pension.

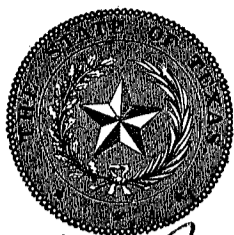
While the law does not make it your duty to forward, at your expense, applications for pensions to this office, if, however, you agree to do so, have the kindness to forward them promptly, because if held, and then rushed in on me a few days before the beginning date of pensions, September 1st and March 1st, respectively, it will not be possible for me to pass upon the merits of such claims. I shall also appreciate notice of deaths of pensioners who reside in your county, which will enable me to fill vacancies as provided for in Section 15.

In conclusion, I respectfully request your co-operation in making the pension roll what it should be—"a roll of honor."

Dear Sir:-

In reading instructions sent out by your office with reference to the matter of making application for thirty dollars allowance on funeral expenses in case of the death of pensioners, I observe that you say all notices of death must be in your office within forty days after the death of the pensioner. I also observe a statement in your instructions to the effect that notices sent in forty-one days or more after the death of a pensioner will not be honored. In construing this, I understand that the absolute requisite is that you must have notice of the death of the pensioner not more than forty days after his or her death. I take it that the proof of the claim can be sent in after the forty days have expired and still the claim will be honored by you with payment.

The reason I am writing you about this matter is, that the widow of a pensioner who died in our county two or three months ago has failed, according to my understanding, to get the proof of her claim into your office, although the notice of the pensioner's death was furnished to you and blanks were sent out from your office to be executed by the claimant.
